seeing loads of distros from Australia. It could be the lull before the storm, as some of the major distros are at the beta test stage. It could be the 'Ubuntu effect' so many distros are based on Ubuntu nowadays that there's always a flurry of releases in the month or so following an official Ubuntu release. Or it could be that everyone is too busy re-evaluating their encryption and security options to get on with any coding (thanks a bunch NSA).

This is a good time of year to release a new distro, because there's far more chance of being noticed than among the clamour at the end of every April and October. This situation makes it more difficult to find something good for the DVD, but also makes the task far more interesting. Some of the distros we looked at while putting the DVD together were somewhat sub-optimal, but many provided a real alternative to the standard fare for the major players, most of which started out as alternative distros or respins themselves. It's good to be reminded how much creativity there is in the

## LXLE



This is another distribution that is meant to be able to run well on older hardware, but that doesn't mean that those of you with recent, more powerful computers should ignore it. Running something like LXDE, which this uses, after having become accustomed to Gnome, Unity or KDE is a revelation - it's so fast and smooth. Some of these lightweight systems can be a little utilitarian, but LXLE also looks really good. This distro is based on the long term support release of Lubuntu, so don't expect the latest bleeding-edge software - do expect a fast, smooth and stable system.

## OS/4 OpenLinux

All too often distros, desktops in particular, are compared with Windows, but not everyone started with that operating system. Many of us cut our teeth on the Amiga (some go back even further but that's another story), and they may find some familiarity in OS/4 OpenLinux, not least in its logo. In fact, it looks so like AmigaOS in some ways that the website carries a disclaimer that it is not affiliated with Amiga Inc! In fact, this is a KDE desktop and this is the 64-bit version, so don't try running it on a 7MHz 68000 CPU.

Things don't always go according to plan, so it is useful to have a 'get out of trouble' option. For us that means having a live distro handy, and

preferably one that includes plenty of the tools that you will need to deal with any sort of emergency. A good example of such a distribution is Grml, which we have included in both 32- and 64-bit flavours.


